AAEA Trust Profile: Hope Michelson

AAEA Trust Profile is a new bi-monthly series following up with <u>AAEA Trust</u> sponsored scholarship, fellowship and grant winners. This month's issue features Hope Michelson, an assistant professor at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Hope received the <u>Chester O. McCorkle, Jr. Scholarship</u> in 2007 while attending Cornell University. The McCorkle Scholarship supports applied research by a graduate student on economic issues relating to agriculture. Hope's research proposal, which won her the scholarship, collected and analyzed a unique household-level data set essential to study the welfare effects over time of a local and international marketing revolution on Nicaraguan small farmer operations.



How did winning the scholarship help accomplish your research goals?

The Chester O. McCorkle Scholarship, along with a Social Science Research

Council International Dissertation Research
Fellowship and a USAID Basis AMA CRSP, funded my
dissertation research in Nicaragua. The study, part of
a broader research project undertaken in
collaboration with researchers at Michigan State
University and the Universidad Centroamericana,
analyzed the dynamics of small farmers' participation
in Nicaraguan supermarket supply chains. I also
estimated the effects of participation on small
farmers' wealth – measured by changes in their
productive asset portfolios relative to comparison
non–participant farmers.

For the study, we identified and surveyed all Nicaraguan farmers who had sold horticulture to Walmart or the domestic supermarket, La Colonia, between 2000 and 2008. As a comparison group, we resurveyed an existing nationally—representative panel of farmers confined to areas where I had determined supermarkets had been sourcing. I also spent a lot of time gathering price data from markets and cooperatives so that we could analyze the supermarket and traditional market price distributions.

I spent one year living in Nicaragua; many months that year I spent on the road in pickup trucks with teams of enumerators tracking down and surveying farmers. The support from AAEA was critical to completing this large-scale and logistically intensive research project.

My dissertation won the <u>Honorable Mention for</u>

<u>Outstanding Doctoral Dissertation</u> of the Year from the AAEA in 2011 and the research has been published in *World Development* and the <u>American</u>

<u>Journal of Agricultural Economics</u>.

What are you researching/working on now?

My research has two primary threads, both concerned with the relationships between agriculture, poverty, and market institutions in the developing world. One theme of my work continues to focus on the evolving relationships between new large-scale market systems for agricultural products and small farmers in emerging economies. I have extended my dissertation work and now have a large project studying the structure of Walmart's supply chains in China and the implications for small farmer participation. The work is in collaboration with University of California, Davis and The Center for Chinese Agricultural Policy in Beijing. A second thread of my research uses prices, household data, government production data, and satellite imagery to study small farmer fertilizer use and food security. With soil scientists at Columbia's Agriculture and Food Security Center (where I just completed a post-doctoral fellowship), I am studying which economically viable policies can bring about a sustainable increase in sub-Saharan Africa's soil fertility. We are also studying the small farmer investment and yield effects of a new innovation that uses rapid in-the-field soil testing to improve soil information and management recommendations to farmers in Tanzania.

What made you decide to pursue agricultural economics?

I studied History and English Literature in college. Even so, through my volunteer work in Washington, DC on problems of social justice and education equity and through my History and Policy courses, I had begun to understand the special power of economic vocabulary and methodology. However, though I had always been a strong math student and

had taken a wide range of classes in undergraduate, I didn't enroll in my first economics course until my senior year of college when I decided to apply for a MS in agricultural economics. Agricultural economics appealed to me as a direct and urgent place to work, given my interests in poverty and development.

What do you hope to research/work on in the future?

On January 15th of this year, I started a new position as Assistant Professor in the Department of Agricultural and Consumer Economics at the University of Illinois at Urbana–Champaign. At the University of Illinois, I will continue to build a body of research based in quantitative analysis, fieldwork and interdisciplinary partnerships to gain insights into strategies for reducing poverty and hunger in the developing world. I see agricultural economics as a way of understanding political and ethical problems of immediate relevance: chronic poverty, the challenges of development, and the impact of a rapidly globalizing economy on local privations and freedoms.

Editorship of the *Applied Economics Perspectives and Policy*Call for Applications

The AAEA Executive Board invites applications for one editor for *Applied Economics Perspectives and Policy (AEPP)* to serve from 2015 through 2017. This call for applications is for an editor to manage Submitted Articles which contain original research results addressing real—world problems with sound research approaches and/or have strong policy relevance within the subject matter of the journal. The degree, to which candidate's expertise complements that of the continuing editors, will be considered in the selection process. The AAEA is particularly interested in candidates who will bring ideas and innovations for helping *AEPP* to further its mission.

Submitted articles will meet the normal standards for scholarly publication, but should also be accessible to the broader audience of agricultural and applied economists working outside academia. Submitted articles should emphasize one or more of the following: a) practical implications for public policy; b) clarification of research implications so as to maximize accessibility and cross-fertilization across specific areas of research; c) empirical comparison of competing theories, explanations, and approaches that can refine future research; and d) development of fruitful directions for future research. Additional information about the *AEPP*, its policies and mission is available at www.aaea.org/publications/aepp.

The editor will work with an editorial team comprised of another Submitted Articles Editor, and a Managing Editor to manage the manuscript review process. The Submitted Articles Editors are responsible for day-to-day issues relating to

submitted articles, assisting with development of the Special Issues, and revising editorial policy. The *AEPP* editorial process employs electronic submission of manuscripts and interchange between editors and reviewers. An electronic system that tracks manuscripts through submission, review, and editorial decision is used by the editors for managing work flow. Authors can also query this system for e-mail reports on the status in the editorial process of a submitted manuscript. The editors also oversee the work of Oxford University Press in preparing copy for printing and reviewing proofs.

The new editor should be prepared to begin on January 1, 2015. There may be some training and coordination work starting around November 1. Applications should include a statement of editorial philosophy and ideas for furthering the journal's goals, an indication of the candidate's principal areas of expertise to support the AEPP's mission, a curriculum vitae, and a statement of administrative and financial support to be provided by the host institution. AAEA will provide financial assistance to defray some portion of the editor's time and most expenses. Applications should be sent electronically via PDF to Brian Mondragón Jones, Executive Director, at bmjones@aaea.org by March 1, 2014. Decisions will be made by early April. Third-party nominations of potentially interested candidates who can then be solicited for their materials are also welcome.

Farm Bill Update -On February 4, 2014, the U.S. Senate, with a vote of 68 to 32, approved the conference report to accompany HR 2642, the Farm Bill Conference Report, titled the "Agricultural Act of 2014". The President is expected to sign the legislation into law on Friday, February 7 in Michigan.

Farm Bill Title VII, Research - One notable change in the research title includes \$200 million of Commodity Credit Corporation funding for the Foundation for Food and Agriculture Research (FFAR). The FFAR funding is mandatory and establishes a nonprofit corporation designed to supplement USDA's basic and applied research activities. The Foundation will solicit and accept private donations to award grants for collaborative public/private partnerships with scientists at USDA and in academia, nonprofits, and the private sector. The Board of Directors consists of the following exofficio members: the Secretary of Agriculture; the Under Secretary of Agriculture for Research, Education, and Economics; the Administrator of the Agricultural Research Service; the Director of the National Institute of Food and Agriculture; and the Director of the National Science Foundation. Eight at-large board members shall be selected from a list of candidates to be provided by the National Academy of Sciences. Seven at-large board members will be selected from candidates provided by industry.
