Call for Applications Editorship of the *American Journal of Agricultural Economics*

Editorship appointments for the *American Journal of Agricultural Economics (AJAE*) are staggered such that two new appointments are made every two years. The AAEA Board now seeks applications for two editors to be appointed for a four-year term, beginning in January 2016. Each editor handles approximately one-fourth of the submitted manuscripts and makes independent editorial decisions on these submissions. The degree to which candidate's expertise complements that of the continuing editors, James Vercammen and JunJie Wu, will be considered in the selection process.



In addition, editors share the administrative responsibilities of managing the *A/AE*. Each editor should plan to dedicate 25 to 40 percent of his/her time to *A/AE* editorial duties. AAEA will provide financial assistance to defray some portion of the editors' time and most expenses.

The new editors should be prepared to begin the transition process on August 1, 2015 and expect to be fully engaged in editorial duties by January 1, 2016. The AAEA Board will make final selections by early 2015. Interested candidates can consult the journal website for information on the journal at http://www.ajae.oxfordjournals.org/. Please note that all editors need to maintain their AAEA membership throughout their service to the journal.

Applications should include a brief statement expressing interest which should include applicant's areas of expertise and editorial philosophy for the *AJAE*, curriculum vitae (including descriptions of previous editorial work) and statements of administrative support from the candidate's department chair, dean or other appropriate administrative officer. Applications should be sent electronically via PDF to Brian Mondragón Jones, Executive Director, at bmjones@aaea.org by December 1, 2014. Nominations of potentially interested candidates who can then be solicited for their materials are also welcome.

Call for Nominations: Travel Grants for Economists from Low Income & Lower-Middle Income Countries

The Agricultural & Applied Economics Association (AAEA) Trust invites nominations for economists from low and lower-middle income countries to be awarded full travel grants to attend the 2015 AAEA & WAEA Joint Annual Meeting in San Francisco, CA, July 26-28. Nominees should be professional economists who are from and residing in a low income or lower-middle income country. Nominees should be working in one or more of the following fields or another closely related field of applied economics: agribusiness economics and Management, agricultural economics, economic development, food and consumer economics, regional economics, or resource and environmental economics.

Nominations should include:

- 1. Nominee's name, institution, postal address, and e-mail address.
- 2. Nominator's name, institution, postal address, and e-mail address.
- 3. Brief statement of support written by the nominator.

- 4. Brief statement of interest written by the nominee.
- 5. Proposed travel budget.
- 6. Paper (no longer than 20pp. double-spaced pages, including tables and figures) describing the research to be presented at the meetings

*Eligible nominators include department chairs or administrators, advisors, or any AAEA member.

Nomination packages should be submitted electronically in a single PDF to Brian Mondragón Jones at bmjones@aaea.org by 5 pm CDT on Tuesday, November 4, 2014.

Selected applicants will be scheduled to present their research (as a paper or poster) during the meeting. Details regarding presentation will be provided after the acceptance notices are sent out.

- 1. Title of proposed session and the proposed date and time that the workshop would take place (potential dates include Saturday, July 25 and Wednesday, July 29).
- 2. Objectives of the workshop, as well as the timeliness of the subject and why the content of the workshop is relevant to AAEA members/meeting attendees.
- 3. Potential speakers, presenters, or panel members, and the total time required for these presentations.

- 4. Intended audience and expected attendance at the workshop.
- 5. Contact information for organizers in charge of overall development and coordination (complete addresses, phone numbers, and e-mail addresses).

On Demand

- 6. Complete budget information, which includes: financial support expected, speakers' fees, stipends, and honoraria, catering needs, administrative fees, and other income and costs. Detailed information will be needed, including any catering requests (e.g. boxed lunches, buffet, coffee breaks, etc.), so that a registration fee for the workshop can be determined.
- 7. Any requests for membership and/or registration fee waivers that may be required in order to properly conduct the workshop.
- 8. Any special software or electronic needs, including if the attendees will be required to bring a laptop.

Incomplete proposals cannot be considered. Please include as much information as needed when submitting; there is no minimum or maximum length for the proposal.

Call for Proposals: Invited Paper Sessions

AAEA welcomes <u>proposals for Invited Paper sessions</u> for the <u>2015 AAEA & WAEA Joint Annual Meeting</u> in San Francisco. Papers in these Invited Paper sessions may be published in the *American Journal of Agricultural Economics* in March 2016 subject to review (If your paper is accepted, you must inform Kristen Wright at <u>kwright@aaea.org</u> of your plan to submit *or* not to submit to *AJAE* by March 18. Within that notification, authors should include a 250 word abstract of their paper).

Proposals from individuals or groups need to be submitted using the online submission system by **Thursday, December 4, 2014.** The online submission system opens in early November.

Proposed session formats must include either two papers with two discussants or three papers with one discussant. Four paper sessions will not be considered.

Proposals will be evaluated by how well they satisfy the following criteria:

- The proposed session supports the objective of the Association to further the development and dissemination of systematic knowledge of agricultural and applied economics.
- The importance of the session is well-justified.
- The proposed papers are innovative and the topics are likely to generate meaningful discussion during the presentation, as well as interest in a published version.
- It is likely that the session format will be conducive to a clear, focused, and informative presentation of the topics proposed.
- The session theme and paper topics are not repetitive of themes and/or topics previously addressed in Invited Paper sessions.
- The set of sessions will appeal to a broad spectrum of the membership.

Proposals should include session title, session rationale, titles and two-page abstracts of each proposed presentation, and names and contact information of authors, discussants, and moderators.

Proposals will be reviewed and selected by a subcommittee of the AAEA Board. Final versions of the invited papers must be submitted to AgEcon Search by June 24, 2015 and should be submitted to the *AJAE* Proceedings Issue Editor by the same date if the authors wish the invited paper to be reviewed for publication in the AJAE.

Proposals are requested for case studies that show how the application of economic principles to decision making in the public and/or private sectors leads to better decisions. Any topic area that illustrates the application of economic principles is acceptable. Topic areas focusing on emerging issues such as: renewable ingredients, energy economics, food safety, and company environmental policies (e.g., green scorecard) are encouraged. Proposals will be evaluated using the following criteria:

- Deals with a problem that has a high level of importance/interest/relevancy to members of AAEA.
- Clear and concise teaching objective(s) and target audience(s) (e.g. undergraduate students, graduate students, extension audiences).
- Case summary that presents solutions and explanations of how the learning objectives are realized.
- Leads to a better understanding of how the application of economic principles improves decision making.
- A general description of the teaching plan for presenting the case to include expected student use of reference materials.

Proposals should include case title, names and contact information of the authors, and a case outline that covers the company or situation profiled, as well as a detailed outline for the case study. The outline should be 3–5 pages in length and a maximum of 2,000 words. The proposal must also contain an outline and ideas for a teaching note, although the teaching note will not be published with the case. Of the cases submitted, three winning case submissions will be accepted for presentation at the AAEA meetings by February 12, 2015.

Selected case studies (with teaching note when applicable) should be completed by April 14, 2015. These completed versions will be reviewed by the invited case study committee, and feedback to improve the cases will be provided to the author(s). Final versions of the cases must be submitted to AgEcon Search by June 24, 2015 and should be submitted to the *AJAE* Proceedings Issue Editor by the same date if the authors wish the case study to be reviewed for publication in the AJAE.

Budget & Appropriations Update

The government is currently operating under a stopgap funding measure (PL 113-164)

until December 11. Passage or agreement for a 2015 omnibus is not a likely scenario for the partisan lame-duck session. However, appropriators, still seeking to squeeze out an accomplishment this year, insist that the narrow funding differences between the House and the Senate versions of the bill signal possibilities for an omnibus.

In December 2013, lawmakers forged the <u>Bipartisan Budget Agreement</u> (PL 113–67), which suspended sequestration on discretionary spending limits for FY 2014 and 2015. Therefore, funding differences for FY 2015 reflect those in the FY 2014 cycle, indicating that the challenges to passage of an omnibus are not insurmountable. Negotiations on the omnibus will begin the day after the election on November 5. Both chambers are hoping to make some decisions.

The biggest obstacles to movement of the appropriations bills are policy riders and recent changes to congressional leadership. For example, in June then House majority leader Eric Cantor of Virginia lost his seat to David Brat in a primary election, derailing the agriculture appropriations bill on the House floor. There are several policy riders in the House bills that limit investments in climate research, EPA regulations, health-care funding, and school lunches. Additionally, battles over child migration and Ebola funding could impact progress and even splash over into the next Congress.

In November, if Republicans win control of the Senate, they will likely attempt to extend the stopgap into the next Congress. Then they can rewrite the spending bills to reflect GOP priorities or freeze funding for most, if not all, agencies for the rest of FY 2015. Yet, to draw out 2015 could be tiresome, especially when the reapplication of sequestration for the FY 2016 cycle indicates that the real challenges lie with future budgets.

Related to agriculture, the House (HR 4800) and Senate (S 2389) are about 1% apart on overall spending. Both the House and the Senate seek more than the Administration's \$20.4 billion request. They both seek funding for the Women, Infants, and Children nutrition program of \$6.6 billion and \$1 billion for the Food Safety Inspection Service. The most significant gap relates to the CFTC, where there is a 22% difference between the requests.

C-FARE Fall 2014 Board Meeting Update and Meetings

From September 29 to October 1, the Council on Food, Agricultural, and Resource Economics (C-FARE) met in Washington, D.C., to discuss the organization's structure, 2015 work plan, and interaction with its core sponsors. During the meeting, the C-FARE Board approved a draft schedule of work based on available funding. The plan of work includes several education and outreach activities pending on funding.

- The Jon Brandt Policy Forum on the Rural Credit, Infrastructure, and Entrepreneurialism Nexus, which will take place in April 2015. A steering committee will be formed this month to plan the event and advise on fundraising. C-FARE is pleased that the NIFA Regional Rural Development Centers, the C-FARE BREP on Economic Opportunities in Rural Communities, and members of CRENET will be a part of developing this event.
- A Grand Challenges Project for Agricultural and Applied Economics, which will highlight key research questions that need to be addressed to result in solutions to societal challenges. A steering committee based on specific areas of expertise will be assembled in November to guide this project.
- The C-FARE's Webinar Series, which will include three or more webinars pending on funding. Examples include:

 - Other Topics for New Congressional Staff: Overview of the Agricultural Economy (from 'Local' to 'Global'), CFTC Issues, International Development, and Food Safety.
- **The C-FARE Workshop Series, which will include three or more workshops.** These events have not yet been scheduled. They will be cosponsored by the USDA Office of the Chief Economist.
 - *The 'Frontier' of Rural Energy Development: Reflecting on the Dynamics of Rapid Growth.* This event will discuss research on the implications for rural economic development of rapid shale gas development.
 - *Biofuel and Agriculture: Intentional Evolution of the Bioeconomy.* This workshop will assess the long-term sustainability, industry evolution, and policy effectiveness of the bioeconomy.
 - Transportation Infrastructure Implications for Rural Agricultural and Energy Economies. This workshop will discuss the decoupling of the grain and energy transportation systems in the United States, the policies that impact operation, and the long-term trade and local impacts of inefficiencies.

Ecosystem Services Valuation Workshop. This workshop will focus on developing an action plan for how valuation information from regional ecosystem markets and/or other sources can be used within the public policy process.

Please note, C-FARE anticipates undertaking these outreach activities while also coordinating nominations, public comments, network relationships, and D.C. visit days that support greater awareness and appreciation of the work of agricultural and applied economists. C-FARE and AAEA Leadership Visits Summary

On September 30, members of the C-FARE Board of Directors and AAEA Past President, Julie Caswell, met several agency, administrative, and congressional staff, and private sector and NGO leaders. Here is a brief summary of the visits:

- Neil Conklin, President of Farm Foundation, described the economics component of the Soil Renaissance project to the visit's participants. The goal of the project is to quantify the effects of soil health on economic risks and returns. The objectives are to: 1. evaluate the current state of research on the economics of soil health and identify key economic data needs; 2. develop a comprehensive analysis of returns on soil health investments and their effects on risk; and 3. provide producers with information and tools for determining the economic value of soil health management decisions. With assistance from Informa Economics, the leaders of the Soil Renaissance are convening a meeting of economics experts on Tuesday, November 18, in Washington, D.C. C-FARE will attend the meeting and welcomes individuals with expertise and/or resources on soil health valuation to contact the C-FARE Business Office at info@cfare.org. C-FARE will engage relevant Blue Ribbon Expert Panels and AAEA Sections in this regard.
- *Greg Pompelli, Associate Administrator of the Economic Research Service (ERS)*, described the importance of cultivating the next generation of agricultural economics researchers and analysts. He pointed out the importance of C-FARE's summer intern breakfast program. Meeting participants exchanged ideas about how AAEA, NAAEA, ERS, and others can work together to increase mentoring for master's level agricultural economists to close the emerging critical skills gap. Related to ERS research, Associate Administrator Pompelli also highlighted anticipated work related to a new <u>Center for Behavioral Economics and Healthy Food Choice Research</u> and the <u>Center for Behavioral and Experimental Agri–Environmental Policy Research</u>, as well as tools available via the <u>National Household Food Acquisition and Purchase Survey (FoodAPS)</u>. Work on the <u>2014 Farm Bill, Farm Income, Dairy Policy and Production</u>, SNAP/Household Food Security, and <u>Rural Economies</u> projects were mentioned as some of the many issues atop ERS's priority list this fall.
- During the meeting with Dr. Jo Handelsman, Associate Director for Science, Dr. Michael Stebbins, Assistant Director for Biological Research, and Dr. Diana Pankevich, AAAS Science & Technology Policy Fellow at the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP), we discussed policy options related to food waste and food recovery and the role of behavioral economics in elucidating

consumer choices. Experts at the OSTP also expressed an interest in <u>pollinator economics</u>, the <u>human microbiome and antibiotic resistance</u>, the economics of climate change, and aquaculture entrepreneurialism. 'Broader impacts' were also discussed in the context of the need to have an applied economist as one of the core team members of multidisciplinary research teams. Finally, C-FARE and AAEA were invited to submit ideas for "<u>We the Geeks</u>," a program that highlights the future of science, technology, and innovation in the United States. - Visit participants also met *Dr. Parag Chitnis, the new Deputy Director for NIFA's Institute of Food Production and Sustainability (IFPS), and Robbin Shoemaker, NIFA National Program Leader in Economics.* Dr. Chitnis joined NIFA from the National Science Foundation (NSF) Division of Molecular and Cellular Biosciences, where he served as division director. Dr. Chitnis was very interested in the Grand Challenges Project that C-FARE is undertaking in coordination with other organizations representing the profession. He also expressed an interest in receiving a memo from the profession that describes the structural needs that it has in promoting the success and support of early career professionals, integrating economics at the front end of multidisciplinary research, and allowing for grant-structural variability related to the size and number of grants for single investigators or small teams of investigators. He invited the profession to submit through the AFRI request for comments mentioned in annual RFPs.
- The meeting with *Dr. Sally Rockey, Director of Extramural Grant Programs at the National Institutes of Health (NIH),* focused on getting to know the <u>NIH grant structure</u> better. The NIH has different designations for grants, including <u>Research Grants</u> (R series), <u>Career Development Awards</u> (K series), <u>Research Training and Fellowships</u> (T & F series), and <u>Program Project/Center Grants</u> (P series). Since most disease is caused by human behavior, the NIH is interested in intervention and compliance work. Most applied economics work involves population and *epidemiological* studies. Dr. Rockey suggested that C-FARE and AAEA connect with the National Institutes of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases, the National Cancer Institute, and the Office of Disease Prevention to discuss funding opportunities and research gaps.

Members of the C-FARE Board of Directors also met the Bureau of Land Management, congressional agricultural committee staff, CoBank, and the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture on October 1.

The following form can be used by institutions to request electronically designation as a Non-Land Grant College of Agriculture (NLGCA). Within 30 days of submitting this form, NIFA will provide the administrative point of contact specified in the form, with a certification or a response indicating why certification is being denied.
