# 2021 AAEA & WAEA Joint Annual Meeting Registration and Housing are OPEN

AAEA is planning for a hybrid 2021 AAEA & WAEA Joint Annual Meeting in Austin, Texas at the JW Marriott. This will not look like a normal AAEA Annual Meeting. So let us start by laying out some key differences.

- 1. All in-person attendees are required to be fully vaccinated prior to their arrival at the joint annual meeting.

The objective of this workshop is mentor junior faculty (less than 5 years) to transition to agricultural and applied economic departments by providing an orientation to expectations for research, teaching and outreach and develop effective strategies for success. #### **Graduate Students in Agricultural and Applied Economics**

PARTICIPATE IN THE AAEA GSS 2021 POLICY COMMUNICATIONS COMPETITION FOR GRADUATE STUDENTS **Overview** 

In today's market, there are numerous job opportunities for graduate students to enter positions in which they must effectively evaluate policy and communicate with policymakers and non- specialists about how certain issues influence stakeholders in food and agriculture. Communication must be brief, yet powerful, with proper objectivity and inclusion of timely and accurate information. Through this competition, graduate students will have the opportunity to gain experience in both written and verbal policy communication.

#### **Objectives for Participants**

• Evaluate a relevant policy issue

• Carefully construct rhetoric, both written and oral, to provide objective information needed by decision makers

#### Participant Eligibility

Eligible applicants are:

- Graduate students with a graduation date of 2020 or later engaged in agricultural economics, agribusiness, natural resources, community resource economics, or a related field
- Participants must be active members of the AAEA and the GSS at the time of the competition
- Attendance to the AAEA 2021 meetings is suggested but not required. The competition will be delivered in virtual format

#### **Competition Information**

The first round of the competition will require participants to submit a typed policy briefing, not to exceed two pages (double spaced, 12-point font, including references, figures, and graphics). Policy oriented issues can be based upon the graduate student's research for a thesis, dissertation, or other academic work. This document should summarize the background and current status of the issue, key facts (i.e. benefits and costs to different groups), findings, and conclusions. The job of the participant is not to convince the policymaker to take a certain position or vote a certain way, but rather to evaluate, gather, and present the necessary information for the policymaker to make an informed decision regarding the issue.

The final round of the competition will require selected participants to deliver a verbal presentation that accompanies the policy briefing, not to exceed 10 minutes in length (Finalists should be ready to submit a pre-recorded presentation one week before the final round). Within the presentation, the participant should go into more detail about the specificity of the policy issue as well as include more key facts and findings from outside research surrounding the policy issue. Overall, the presentation and written brief should complement each other and form a well- rounded effort in policy communication.

- Friday, June 11, 2021: Registration deadline and policy brief due
- Monday, July 5, 2021: Announcement of the participants selected for the final round
- Sunday, August 1, 2021: Finalists' presentations (virtual), concurrent with the 2021 AAEA Annual Meeting in Austin, TX

- Cover page containing the student participant's name, mentor's name, university, department, address, and contact information
- Policy brief (2-page maximum)

#### **Finalists**

Selected finalists will be notified by July 5, 2021. They are expected to make a virtual 10-minute presentation on Sunday, August 1, 2021, to a panel of judges. Judges will also ask participants questions. The competition

will begin at 8 a.m. (CST). Selection of the finalists will be based on the material submitted and criteria listed below, and those who are selected as finalists will also be evaluated based on the quality of their responses to judges' questions.

#### Criteria for Selecting Finalists and Winners

Criteria for judging finalists and winners will include:

- Defines the problem, discusses feasibility of the policy ideas and steps, addresses a proper audience, background and supporting research, and addresses government failures or unintended consequences.
- Integration of knowledge, persuasiveness of argument, and variety of sources.
- Formal language, appropriate tone, grammar and mechanics, and logical organization of thoughts and ideas.
- Proper format of policy briefing (proper headings, length no more than two pages, proper citation, ordered appearance).

#### **Awards**

The top 3 competitors selected will be recognized at the AAEA Awards Ceremony. A plaque, along with a cash award will be granted to the top three finalists. Cash prizes are:

First place: \$300Second place: \$200Third place: \$100

# Call for Participation 2021 AEM-GSS Virtual Case Study Competition

The Agribusiness Economics and Management (AEM)-Graduate Student Section (GSS) Case Study Competition allows graduate students to test their communication skills and their ability to apply their knowledge of agricultural economics and agribusiness subjects to practical situations.

Competition Rules and Timeline: Each team must complete the 2021 AEM-GSS Case Study Registration Form by July 9, 2021. Teams can be comprised of up to three graduate students. Students may either compete as a team from the same university or partner with students from other universities. If there is only one student from a university that wants to participate, the student can compete on their own; or they can be matched with other students. In the case of teams that are matched with individuals from different universities, competitors will be notified of their teammates as soon as possible, and no later than the same day the case is announced.

The case will be sent to teams in late–July, and teams will be given approximately two weeks to prepare an oral summary of their solution to the case that will last no more than 15 minutes. The presentation should be recorded and submitted in advance for evaluation. Presentations lasting over 15 minutes will be penalized. The following week, teams will then (virtually) meet with judges for a live Q&A session. The live Q&A session will take place on Friday, August 20, 2021. There will be two rounds to the live section of the competition. In the first round, teams will answer questions from a panel of judges. The judges will then select the top three teams as finalists. The finalists will present their case live to a new panel of judges.

#### **Call for Papers**

Special Issue, "Agricultural and Applied Economics and Inequity and Discrimination Faced by African Americans in the United States"

Applied Economics Perspectives and Policy

The editors of AEPP invite authors to submit articles for a special issue on inequities and discrimination faced by African Americans in the United States related to topics within agricultural and applied economics. AEPP publishes research related to agriculture; animal, plant, and human health; energy; environment; food and consumer behavior; international development; natural hazards, natural resources; population and migration; and regional and rural development. In this Special Issue, we are particularly interested in the intersection of these topics with inequities and discrimination faced by African Americans. Possible topics for papers in this issue include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Implications of the Pigford v. Glickman suit and related cases on Black farmer land loss
- 2. Funding differences in experiment stations and extension systems between 1862 and 1890 institutions and impacts on African American outcomes related to food and agriculture
- 3. Evaluation of differences in intergenerational mobility of African American students between 1890 and 1862 institutions
- 4. Implications of agricultural land loss on present-day wealth and wealth-related disparities
- 5. Racial disparities, property values, and Black and white farmers in rural America
- 6. Disparities in federal and state funding at 1890 Land-Grant Institutions. Specifically, inequality in the distribution of funding support for research, teaching, and 4-H programs at 1890 institutions
- 7. Disparities by race in human capital development, income inequality, family/community resiliency, or disaster preparedness and their impacts on population and migration and/or rural and regional development, with a particular focus on the African American experience
- 8. Disparities by race in food security, with a particular focus on the African American experience
- 9. Black farmers' access to financial capital
- 10. Examination of alternative farm policy frameworks that continue systemic racism with government support and emergency payments. Black farmer participation levels in local food systems could be assessed in this context.

# Special Issue, "Fostering Diversity and Inclusion in Agribusiness and Agricultural Economics Classrooms and Departments"

Applied Economics and Teaching Resources

Applied Economics and Teaching Resources is calling for manuscripts on teaching methods, curriculum development, and programs to foster diversity and inclusion in agribusiness and agricultural economics classrooms and departments. Across the academy, researchers have documented the adverse effects of racial and economic inequality, gender discrimination, stereotype enforcement, and social polarization on university students in the United States. Less has been documented about these issues within agribusiness management, agricultural economics, and related undergraduate and graduate university programs. The goal of this special issue is to further our understanding of educational inequalities for students of different economic, racial, sexual, and cultural backgrounds. Further, we seek articles that report on classroom, department, college, or multi-institutional programs designed to foster and support students from diverse backgrounds.

The special issue will highlight instructor, department, and college-level programs and policies which have resulted in improvements or exacerbated challenges in enhancing the learning experience and outcomes for underserved and under-represented graduate or undergraduate students. The issue will inform faculty and administrators approaches to creating a safe and caring space for inclusive student learning. Authors may also report on lasting impacts of programmatic shortcomings or innovations on minority students, alumni, faculty, and the profession. We encourage research that implements the collective trauma recovery framework, weaver-leader framework, active and learner-centered pedagogy, traditional and remote classroom environments, and personal or group narratives. We welcome research papers, methods papers, case studies, or commentaries. Authors may employ qualitative, quantitative, or mixed methods approaches in researching both shortcomings and successes of programs.

### Government Relations & Washington Update

#### May 2021

#### Biden FY 2022 Budget Proposal Released

On May 28th, President Biden released his <u>proposed budget</u> for fiscal year 2022. The budget proposal calls for a total of \$6 trillion in federal spending, with significant increases projected for most federal departments. The proposed <u>discretionary budget for the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)</u> is \$29.9 billion, which reflects a 9 percent increase or \$2.6 billion above the 2021 enacted level. Of the \$2.6 billion increase, \$1.4 billion is for program increases and \$1.2 billion, is an elimination of the Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) rescission.

The USDA budget includes \$4 billion to support research to advance the competitiveness of U.S. agriculture, promote food security and increase climate change research. The budget provides \$1.9 billion to support core research projects of the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) covering a wide range of critical problems facing American agriculture, ranging from animal and crop protection and production, new product development, environmental stewardship, food safety, and human nutrition. The National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA) would receive \$1.9 billion to support extramural agricultural research, education, and extension activities. Included in the NIFA total is \$700 million for competitive grants through the Agriculture and Food Research Initiative (AFRI), the fully authorized amount for the program, which is currently funded at \$435 million in FY 2021. A significant increase of \$70 million for the Hatch capacity funding is also included which would move funding from \$259 million up to \$329 million.

The Economic Research Service (ERS) is proposed to receive \$91 million, up from \$85 million in FY 2021, which includes \$4 million in new support for climate science research. For the National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS), the Budget includes \$194 million, including \$46 million for the Census of Agriculture and \$7 million to help measure and inform climate science research.

The FY 2022 budgets for USDA's research, education and economics agencies represent the largest proposed increases for agricultural research in quite some time. However, it is unclear how Congress will respond to the Biden budget. In order to achieve such increases, the budget allocation for the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee will need to be significantly higher than previous years. AAEA recently signed a coalition letter urging for increased allocations for overall agriculture spending. The House is expected to be the first to act on appropriations, with Appropriations Committee Chair, Rosa DeLauro indicating her plans for the committee to complete action on appropriations bills in June with House floor consideration in July.
