AM22 Pre- and Post-conference Workshops

Submissions will be judged on the merits of the proposal and the space and time available at the Annual Meeting. Organizers will work with the AAEA Business Office to develop a budget for final approval at the January Board meeting.

Proposals should be submitted using the <u>Pre- and Post-conference Workshop Proposal form</u> available on the AAEA website, <u>https://www.aaea.org/meetings</u>, Title of proposed session and the proposed date and time that the workshop would take place (potential dates include **Saturday**, **July 30**, **and Wednesday**, **August 3**)

- 1. Objectives of the workshop, as well as the timeliness of the subject and why the content of the workshop is relevant to AAEA members/meeting attendees
- 2. Potential speakers, presenters, or panel members, and the total time required for these presentations.
- 3. Intended audience and expected attendance at the workshop
- 4. Contact information for organizers in charge of overall development and coordination (complete addresses, phone numbers, and e-mail addresses)
- 5. Complete budget information, which includes: financial support expected, speaker travel expenses, stipends, and honoraria, catering needs, administrative fees, and other income and costs. Detailed information will be needed, including any catering requests (e.g. boxed lunches, buffet, coffee breaks, etc.), so that a registration fee for the workshop can be determined
- 6. Any requests for membership and/or registration fee waivers that may be required in order to properly conduct the workshop
- 7. Any special software or electronic needs, including if the attendees will be required to bring a laptop

Incomplete proposals cannot be considered. Please include as much information as needed when submitting; there is no minimum or maximum length for the proposal.

AM22 Invited Paper Sessions

AAEA welcomes proposals for Invited Paper sessions for the 2022 AAEA Annual Meeting in Anaheim, CA. Papers in these Invited Paper sessions may be published in the *Applied Economics Perspectives and Policy (AEPP)* in March 2023, subject to review. Proposals from individuals or groups need to be submitted using the online submission system by **Thursday, December 2, 2021**. The <u>abstract system</u> is open.

The most successful invited papers frame new areas of research, provide a systematic review of an existing area, or offer a novel perspective.

Proposed session formats must include either two papers with two discussants or three papers with one discussant. Four paper sessions will not be considered.

Proposals will be evaluated using the following criteria:

- The proposed session supports the objective of the Association to further the development and dissemination of systematic knowledge of agricultural and applied economics;
- The importance of the session is well-justified;
- The proposed papers are timely and the topics are likely to generate meaningful discussion during the presentation, as well as interest in a published version;
- It is likely that the session format will be conducive to a clear, focused, and informative presentation of the topics proposed;
- The session theme and paper topics are not repetitive of themes and/or topics previously addressed in Invited Paper sessions;
- The set of sessions will appeal to a broad spectrum of the membership.

Proposals should include session title and rationale, two-page abstracts and titles for each proposed presentation, and names and contact information of authors, discussants, and moderators.

The invited papers should be completed by **Thursday**, **April 7**, **2022**. These completed versions will be reviewed by the invited paper sessions committee, and feedback to improve the papers will be provided to the author(s). Final versions of the invited papers must be submitted to AAEA by **Wednesday**, **May 27**, **2022**. If the authors wish the invited paper to be reviewed for publication in the *AEPP*, it should also be submitted to the *AEPP* Editors via Editorial Express by **Wednesday**, **August 24**, **2022**.

Call for Abstracts

AM22 Selected Presentation Papers and Posters

AAEA seeks submissions for Selected Presentations for the 2022 AAEA Annual Meeting in Anaheim, CA. Selected Presentations are a submission category that represents both Selected Papers and Selected Posters. All submissions are reviewed and accepted together, and only after acceptance are the submissions designated as a paper or poster. At the time of submission, individuals will have the option for their submission to be considered as a poster only. There is no paper only option. Abstracts must be received by

Wednesday, January 18, 2022 11:59 PM CST, and should be submitted using AAEA's online Abstract Management System. The <u>abstract system</u> is open.

Submissions for Selected Presentations must include a two-page, single-spaced abstract that provides a clear explanation of what will be presented at the Annual Meeting. Presenting author and co-authors should include in this abstract a discussion of the relevance of the topic, research methodology, and potential for generating discussion during the meeting. Please do not include your name or contact information in the abstract file.

Tips for selecting a Subject Code for your abstract

When submitting your paper to the abstract system you will need to select a subject code. The subject code you select is the category your paper will be grouped in when being reviewed based on a common topic. If accepted, sessions are comprised of abstracts with the same subject codes. To assist you with selecting a subject code the Selected Presentations Committee created keywords for each of the subject codes. We recommend you refer to the keywords for subject codes to help you determine the subject code for your submission.

Abstracts must be received by Wednesday, January 18, 2022 11:59 PM CST, and should be submitted using AAEA's online Abstract Management System. Material previously presented at other meetings cannot be accepted, and the submitting author will be asked to verify that the material has not been presented elsewhere. When entering the title of your abstract, please be sure to submit it as you would like it to appear in the program – with proper capitalization and punctuation.

Review Process

All submissions are subjected to a common, double-blind review process. After the review process has been completed, topic leaders will construct coherent Selected Paper Sessions and Lightning Sessions based on a common topic. All remaining accepted presentations will be assigned as a poster. Presentation proposal acceptance notifications will be sent via email to presenters in March. Emails may be received in spam folders. Should you not find an email by mid-April, please feel free to contact the AAEA Business Office at info@aaea.org or at (414) 918-3190.

Posters

Poster presenters should be available during their assigned interval during the meeting for questions and discussion. The event program and mobile app will list the poster titles, authors, locations, and presentation time. Poster presenters must submit a PDF version of their poster to the AAEA submission site by May 27, 2022 11:59 PM CST. A cover page must be included before uploading. Please prepare a Cover Page using this template and append it to your pdf file before uploading. Please keep submissions under 4 MB. AAEA will upload these posters to the AgEcon Search. Posters that miss this deadline will be withdrawn from the program.

Selected Paper Sessions and Lightning Sessions

Up to 8 papers are included in a 90-minute Lightning Session, and up to 4 papers are included in a 90-minute Selected Paper Session. Therefore, each paper presentation in a Lightning Session is allotted 9 minutes, with 7 minutes to present and 2 minutes for discussion. Likewise, each presentation in a Selected Paper Session is allotted 20 minutes, with 15 minutes for presentation and 5 minutes for discussion.

Presenters of Selected Papers must submit a full version of their paper to the AAEA submission site by May 27, 19, 2022 11:59 PM CST. A cover page must be included before uploading. Please prepare a Cover Page using this template and append it to your pdf file before uploading. Please keep submissions under 4 MB. AAEA will upload these papers to the AgEcon Search. Papers that miss this deadline will be withdrawn from the program. The full version of the paper has no length limitations, but less than 25 pages is preferred. Double-spaced, 8.5 by 11-inch, single-sided format is requested. Please follow the American Journal of Agricultural Economics style guidelines, with the exception of the single table/figure per page convention.

AM22 Organized Symposia

AAEA seeks submissions for Organized Symposia for the 2022 AAEA Annual Meeting in Anaheim, CA. Proposals are due by **Wednesday, January 18, 2022**, and should be submitted using AAEA's online submission system. The <u>abstract system</u> is open.

Organized Symposium sessions highlight ideas or works-in-progress on a topic involving cooperative or competing efforts by two or more panelists. Symposia may involve panel discussions of prepared questions, debates, roundtable meetings, or other formats. Formal paper presentations are discouraged, nonetheless if such presentations are proposed, the organizer should explain how they will fit into a tightly coherent theme.

In all cases, at least half of the session time should be reserved for discussion among the panelists and between the panelists and the audience.

Symposia may offer discussions of policy issues, research methods, emerging research results, teaching or outreach topics, issues in professional organization, or other matters. Proposals should include: session title, session rationale, names and contact information for the organizer and other participants, and a description of the symposium format that includes plans for discussion.

At least one proposer for the organized symposium must be a member of AAEA, and all presenters, speakers, and/or discussants at the Annual Meeting must be members of AAEA and registered for the Annual Meeting by Thursday, May 18, 2022.

Call for Proposals:

Case Studies

AAEA welcomes proposals for Case Studies for the 2022 AAEA Annual Meeting in Anaheim, CA. Cases in this Invited Paper session may be published in the *Applied Economics Teaching Resources* (*AETR*) in January 2023, subject to review. Proposals from individuals or groups need to be submitted using AAEA's online submission system by **Thursday, December 2, 2021**. The <u>abstract system</u> is open.

Proposals are requested for case studies that show how the application of economic principles to decision making in the public and/or private sectors leads to better decisions. Any topic area that illustrates the application of economic principles is acceptable. Topic areas focusing on emerging issues such as: renewable ingredients, energy economics, food safety, and company environmental policies (e.g., green scorecard) are encouraged.

Proposals will be evaluated using the following criteria:

- Deals with a problem that has a high level of importance/interest/relevancy to members of AAEA
- Clear and concise teaching objective(s) and target audience(s) (e.g. undergraduate students, graduate students, extension audiences)
- Case summary that presents solutions and explanations of how the learning objectives are realized
- Leads to a better understanding of how the application of economic principles improves decision making
- A general description of the teaching plan for presenting the case to include expected student use of reference materials

Proposals should include case title, names, contact information of the authors, and a case outline that covers the company or situation profiled, as well as a detailed outline for the case study. The outline should be 3-5 pages in length and a maximum of 2,000 words. The proposal must also contain an outline and ideas for a teaching note, although the teaching note will not be published with the case. Of the cases submitted, three winning case submissions will be accepted for presentation at the AAEA meetings by **March 10, 2022.**

Selected case studies (with teaching note when applicable) should be completed by **Thursday, April 7, 2022.** These completed versions will be reviewed by the invited case study committee, and feedback to improve the cases will be provided to the author(s). Final versions of the cases must be submitted to AAEA by **Wednesday, May 27, 2022.** If the authors wish the case study to be reviewed for publication in the *AETR*, it should also be submitted to the *AETR* Editor by **Wednesday, May 27, 2022.** Accepted papers will carry a footnote that indicates they were subject to an expedited review process.

Examples of appropriate cases can be found in the agricultural and applied economics literature including the *American Journal of Agricultural Economics* (issues 94 (2) and 93 (2)), *International Food and Agribusiness Management Review* and the *Journal of the Food Distribution Research Society*. - Co-authorship and/or other collaboration that provides major learning opportunities for junior, female, and/or minority colleagues
- Active advocacy for the professional advancement of these colleagues

Nomination Guidelines

- Nominations are due on February 9, 2022.
- Nominees must be a 2022 member of AAEA.

Nomination materials

- Nomination letter
 - Maximum of 3 single-spaced pages
 - The nomination letter must be written by a 2022 member of AAEA.
 - This letter will be the centerpiece for evaluation and should give examples (with the names of mentees) of how the nominee has systematically collaborated with, advocated for, and/or created growth opportunities for junior, female, and/or minority colleagues.
 - The letter must include the nominee's name, affiliation, and email address, as well as the nominator's name, affiliation, and email address.

- o The file name of the letter should include the phrase 'nomination letter.'
- Current CV of the nominee
 - o No more than 15 pages, 12 point font, Single line space, 1" margin on both sides.
 - Highlight mentoring activities, achievement, and accomplishment of mentorship based on the award criterion.
- Between 3 and 5 supporting letters, written by those mentored by the nominee
 - o Each supporting letter should be a maximum of 2 single-spaced page.
 - Between 3 and 5 supporting letters, written by those mentored by the nominee.
 - The nomination letter and letters of support must focus on three things
 - clearly described activities to promote/support others
 - clearly described impacts and influences
 - significant and unique contributions to mentoring within and outside own institutions
 - Letters should be written by those mentored by the nominee, and illustrate the nominee's mentoring efforts and how these changed the professional trajectory of the letter writer.

Bruce Gardner Memorial Prize for Applied Policy Analysis Award

The Bruce Gardner Memorial Prize for Applied Policy Analysis Award recognizes outstanding impact on agricultural, food, environmental, development and other related policy, based on sound foundations in economic theory, in the tradition of Bruce Gardner. Policy issues are interpreted in their broadest sense. They may relate to either a national or international situation. The purpose of the award is to encourage sound economic analysis of a broad set of public policy issues that provides timely and relevant information for more effective public policy and program discussions. The award is intended to focus attention on important efforts in research, education or public service, which facilitate the policy process and improve public performance and understanding. A maximum of one award is given annually. The award will carry a cash prize of \$1,500 and plaque of recognition financed by the Bruce Gardner Memorial Special Purpose Fund of the AAEA Trust. The Bruce Gardner Memorial Prize for Applied Policy Analysis Award Subcommittee is encouraged to generate nominations to assure that all outstanding policy contributions are considered.

Nomination Guidelines

Nominations are due on **February 9, 2022**. Nominations may be submitted by individuals, groups, or institutions. An individual nominated for the award, or at least one individual in the case of a group nomination, must be a 2022 AAEA member. Winners will be selected on the basis of supporting materials showing major contributions within the previous five years. Re-nominations are invited provided the supporting materials are updated.

Re-nominations are invited if supporting materials are brought up to date and resubmitted.

Evaluation

Each nominee will be evaluated on the quality of work indicated by the nomination letter and supporting materials relative to the following criteria:

- 1. Ability to clearly define an important problem and target audience. Special consideration will be given to programs and professionals that expand the reach of the profession by identifying and targeting underserved, nontraditional and/or new audiences
- 2. Proficiency in conceptualizing and applying educational approaches, which utilize appropriate qualitative and quantitative analysis, primarily economics, but with other relevant disciplines included if appropriate
- 3. Effective communication, as measured by appropriateness of teaching materials to intended audience, quality of communication media, and innovation in communication methods
- 4. Evidence of accomplishment and impact through improved understanding, decision-making, or behavioral change in the target audience

Distinguished Teaching Awards

- Nominators and Nominees must be 2022 members of AAEA.
- Re-nominations are encouraged, provided materials are updated and resubmitted. If a nominee has
 previously won a Distinguished Teaching Award, the selection is based on activities subsequent to the
 previous award.
- Nominees must be actively engaged in teaching at a professional level during the 2021-2022 school year.

Evaluation

The following five major areas are considered in evaluating nominations:

- 1. Quality of teaching
- 2. Academic advising, counseling, extracurricular activities, and career support with students
- 3. Campus participation in instructional, course, and curricular improvement efforts
- 4. Evidence of a commitment to promoting and enhancing diversity and inclusion within and through teaching efforts, including but not limited to (i) creating and revising coursework, experiential learning

opportunities, curriculum and programmatic initiatives, (ii) student mentoring initiatives, and (iii) leadership in engaging campus stakeholders and peers within the applied economics discipline.

- 5. Professional development leading to improvement in teaching for benefit of self and peers
- 6. Department/college/university teaching awards and other teaching related recognitions at national/international level

Outstanding Doctoral Dissertation Award

A maximum of three awards are given each year, and a \$1000 cash prize accompanies each award.

Nomination Guidelines

Nominations are due on February 9, 2022.

- The nominator must be a 2022 AAEA member.
- One nomination may be submitted for every 12 doctoral dissertations of a department that was
 presented to a graduate school faculty in the calendar year preceding the year of recognition. Selection
 will be made from documentation approved in final form by the student's advisory committee.
 Departments should limit nomination consideration to dissertations in fields consistent with the vision
 statement.
- A published dissertation may be entered for the Outstanding Doctoral Dissertation Award as well as other AAEA Annual Awards, but is only eligible to win one award that year.

Washington Update - November 2021

Agricultural Research Investments Scaled Back in New Build Back Better Framework

After tense negotiations, the Biden Administration and Congressional Democrats have released a revised framework for the President's Build Back Better initiative. In response to concerns from Senators Manchin (D–WV) and Sinema (D–AZ), the overall funding through the budget reconciliation package was reduced from \$3.5 trillion to \$1.85 trillion. As a result in the reduction in funding, revisions were made to many sections of the package, including programs related to agricultural research. The original package included over \$7 billion for agricultural research. The new framework now proposes \$2 billion in agricultural research investments. Below is a summary of key agricultural research provisions:

Agricultural Research Programs in Build Back Better Framework:

- \$1 billion for grants to covered institutions (minority serving institutions including 1890 and 1994 Land Grant Institutions and Hispanic Serving Institutions) for construction, alteration, acquisition, modernization, renovation, or remodeling of agricultural research facilities under the Research Facilities Act.
- \$5 million to the National Agricultural Statistics Service for measurements, survey, and data collection to conduct the study regarding urban, indoor, and emerging agricultural production.
- \$210 million to fund agricultural education, extension, and research relating to climate change through the Agriculture and Food Research Initiative.
- \$120 million for the Sustainable Agriculture Research Education program
- \$60 million for Organic Agriculture Research and Extension Initiative
- \$5 million for the Urban, Indoor, and Other Emerging Agricultural Production Research, Education, and Extension Initiative
- \$5 million for 1890's Centers of Excellence
- \$60 million for the Specialty Crop Research and Extension Initiative
- \$80 million for 1862 institutions agricultural extension activities and research relating to climate change, technical assistance, and technology adoption
- \$35 million for 1994 institutions agricultural extension activities and research relating to climate change, technical assistance, and technology adoption
- \$40 million for 1890 institutions agricultural extension activities and research relating to climate change, technical assistance, and technology adoption
- \$100 million for scholarships for students at 1890 Institutions
- \$15 million for grants to land-grant colleges and universities to support Tribal students under the Higher Education Multicultural Scholars Program

• \$30 million for the Office of the Chief Scientist, to carry out advanced research and development relating to climate through the Agriculture Advanced Research and Development Authority (AgARDA)

- **\$210 million** for the Foundation for Food and Agriculture Research, to carry out activities relating to climate change
- \$10 million for the Office of Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production

While the revised numbers reflect significant decreases from the original proposal, they still reflect the opportunity for a major infusion of new investments in agricultural research related to climate change and resources to support research facility improvements at minority serving institutions.

Congress is still working through challenges on the timeline and procedure for advancing the framework. The new framework has addressed many of the concerns of more moderate Democrats; however, the reduced spending level has raised concerns with some progressives who are pushing for larger investments. Further complicating the situation is the bipartisan infrastructure package that passed the Senate months ago. Moderates are insistent that the bipartisan package move forward, while progressives are standing firm that approval of the Build Back Better legislation be tied to passage of the bipartisan bill. Democratic leaders had hoped to move both packages swiftly, but action has been delayed as the progressive and moderate wings of the party continue negotiations.

Other News

Farm Foundation: January 2022 Cultivator Program

A unique opportunity for current undergraduate or graduate students of agriculture to attend the highly regarded Farm Foundation Round Table through our Cultivator program.

Up to six undergraduate or graduate students from an accredited North American college or university will be selected from a competitive pool of applicants to participate in the January 2022 Farm Foundation Round Table meeting, taking place over January 11 - January 14, 2022 in Delray Beach, Florida.

A program of Farm Foundation, Round Table is an invitational group of approximately 150 C-suite food and agricultural leaders and their guests who meet semi-annually to discuss issues of importance to agribusiness, the food system and rural communities. The sessions are intended to provide ideas and learning experiences that participants may use in their own activities. The program for the January 2022 meeting will focus on Resilience for Success: Agriculture's Enduring Impact. Sessions will focus on resilience within agricultural supply chains, market resilience and agricultural trade, environmental resilience with a focus on water and issues impacting Florida, and other topics such as resilience in labor markets and new innovative technologies.

Cultivators would be expected to attend an orientation on Tuesday, January 11 and would participate in a daylong tour of agriculture-related sites around southeast Florida on Wednesday, January 12. On Thursday, January 13, Cultivators will give a brief research presentation over breakfast, and have opportunities throughout the meeting to share their research and network throughout the meeting.

Students selected for the Cultivator Program will receive an award that will cover all hotel and registration expenses. The nominating university or college will be responsible for the student's other travel expenses, including flights, other transportation, and incidental travel expenses. If a selected student from a nominating school is unable to attend the Round Table for any reason, another student will be named in their place. Participation requirements include attending each virtual Round Table session, actively engaging with Round

Table participants throughout the meeting, and making a brief (approximately 5-8 minute) presentation on an area of research related to the meeting's theme. We are especially interested in presentations that touch on issues related to resilience in agriculture such as: labor markets, supply chains, environment, and trade.
