Call for Nominations: AAEA President-Elect and Directors

The AAEA Nominating Committee is soliciting nominations from AAEA membership for AAEA President-Elect and two AAEA Directors, all for three-year terms beginning July 2024.

Call for Nominations 2024 Fellows Award Nominations

The AAEA Fellows Selection Committee is inviting nominations for the 2024 AAEA Fellows Awards. The deadline for submission of nominations and supporting biographical documentation is **Wednesday**, **October 4**, **2023**. Selection is based mainly on a continuous contribution to the advancement of agricultural or applied economics as defined by the Vision Statement of the AAEA. Achievements may be in research, teaching, extension, administration, or business. The nominee must be a living current member of AAEA and have been a member for at least five years.

Please follow these guidelines to submit Fellows nominations (non-complying materials will be returned). The nomination package should focus on documentation of the case for the nominee's contributions rising to a level that warrants recognition as a Fellow. "Continuous contribution" means exceptional service over a period of years. Such exceptional service may be demonstrated by: research discoveries published in major professional journals; leadership in the development of extension programs extensively utilized by other professionals; the development of undergraduate or graduate programs of learning that have become nationally recognized professionally and by students who have, in turn, demonstrated success as a result of these teaching programs; contributions to advance diversity, equity and inclusion objectives in the broader profession through for example, teaching, research collaboration, professional leadership, or outreach to, engagement with, and mentoring of individuals from underrepresented groups; or outstanding performance in government, business, or NGOs. As a general principle, continuous service means more than a single act that might be rewarded by an outstanding journal article, extension, or teaching award. The documentation for the nominee provided should make clear the impact of the individual nominated in the areas of achievement to which the nominee has contributed. This evidence could include, but is not limited to, reference to publications, awards, honors, reports, testimonials to notable tasks undertaken and outcomes achieved, or other contributions to the profession.

Members of the Fellows Selection Committee and AAEA Executive Committee

(President-Elect, President, or Past President) may not nominate or provide support statements for nominees. Nomination packages that include support statements from a member of the Fellows Selection Committee and/or the AAEA Executive Committee will be sent back to the nominator for revisions.

Page 2 Testimonial letters or vitae are not required. The total nomination package should be limited to a maximum of

eight typed pages using 12-point font and with margins of at least one inch on all four sides. All material must be double-spaced. Please include the name, institution, and contact information of all the nominators within the eight-page package. Nominations should be submitted as a single PDF file to Kristen McGuire at kmcguire@aaea.org. Please contact Kristen if you have any guestions.

Please note that the Trust does not fund individual research projects, nor does it retroactively fund activities that have already taken place. Proposal submissions should include:

- 1. A cover sheet with the name of the applicant; applicant's mailing address, e-mail, and phone number; title of the project; abstract of the project; timing, duration, and location of the project; and amount of funding requested.
- 2. A project description, not to exceed five double-spaced pages, including the purpose (and how that aligns with the goals above), scope, implementation procedures, the individuals responsible for the management of the project, the date/timing of the project, and location of the project.
- 3. An itemized budget indicating costs to be borne by the Trust and funding provided by other sources, if any. The AAEA Business Office may be a resource for budget information. Proposals are strongly encouraged to secure matching outside funds. Fund requests should remain under \$20,000.

Proposals should be submitted as a single PDF file by Monday, October 16, 2023, to ensure consideration for funding for the next year. Proposals will be reviewed by the AAEA Trust Committee, which will make recommendations to the Executive Board for action at the January 2024 Board Meeting.

Anthony Grano Fellowship Applications

The AAEA Trust is now accepting applications for the Anthony Grano Scholarship Award for 2024. Uma Lele AERA India/AAEA Mentorship Program

Call For Applications Uma Lele Mentor Fellowship Award for Women

The Agricultural & Applied Economics Association (AAEA) Trust is now accepting applications for the Uma Lele Mentor Fellowship Award for Women supports a mentorship relationship between an early career woman agricultural, resource and environmental economist from low income and lower-middle income countries, and a mentor who is a member of the AAEA. A complete list of qualifying countries is available under the headings "Low-income economies" and "Lower-middle-income economies" at: <u>http://data.worldbank.org/about/country-classifications/country-and-lending-groups#Low_income</u>.

The purpose of the award is to promote high quality research of a policy/problem solving nature, by fostering research collaboration between the scholar and mentor. Research topics should fall within the mission of the AAEA (www.aaea.org/about-aaea), but preference will be given to topics focusing on countries that are facing food and nutrition insecurity, and/or environmental pressures.

The total amount of the award is up to USD \$5,000. Of this, up to USD \$4,500 will be allocated to the scholar and up to USD 500 to the mentor. The award to the scholar is intended to cover travel, registration, and related costs of the scholar to attend a meeting organized by the AAEA or the ICAE where both the mentor and the scholar can meet. The award may also be used to cover travel costs to the mentor's workplace. The amount allocated to the mentor can be used for travel and other expenses during the fellowship period. The AAEA will waive registration fee for both the scholar and the mentor for the duration of the fellowship. AAEA will also waive annual membership fee for the scholar for the duration of the fellowship.

Women scholars, who are either within one year of obtaining a Ph.D. in Agricultural Economics, Economics, or related field, or within five years of having completed Ph.D. and are citizens of and reside in a low income and lower-middle income country are eligible to apply. Ph.D. students studying in countries that are not considered low-income economies and lower-middle-income economies may also apply, but they must be

close to completing their degree and planning to permanently reside in a low-income or a lower-middleincome country by the end of 2024. Mentors can reside in any part of the world, but they must be AAEA members.

To apply, scholars should submit the following:

- 1. Recent CV
- 2. Research proposal outlining the research project that the applicant will work on with his or her mentor (maximum 3 single-spaced pages). Applicants are advised to discuss the proposal with a prospective mentor before applying.
- 3. Letter of recommendation from the applicant's department head/supervisor stating that the institution supports the applicant's participation.
- 4. Name and details of the mentor. If the scholar has not yet decided on a mentor, they may state this and seek input from the selection committee. The selection committee will make every attempt to help identify appropriate mentors but will do so only for the selected applicants.
- 5. Letter of intent to collaborate from the proposed mentor if the applicant already has a mentor.

Call for Applications Uma Lele Mentor Fellowship Award

The Agricultural & Applied Economics Association (AAEA) Trust is now accepting applications for the Uma Lele Mentor Fellowship Award. The Uma Lele Mentor Fellowship Award supports a mentorship relationship with a view to promote high quality research of a policy/problem solving nature in countries with food insecurity and environmental pressures. It is meant to promote collaboration between an early career scholar who is a citizen of and resides in a developing country and a distinguished mentor.

The award is intended to cover the costs of travel and expenses for a scholar and mentor to work together on a specific research project in a high priority area for the scholar's country. The maximum fellowship grant will be \$5,000. Up to \$4,500 can be allocated for travel expenses for the scholar to visit the mentor's workplace and/or to meet with the mentor at a professional meeting. Up to \$1,500 can be allocated for mentor travel and other expenses during the fellowship period. Research topics should fall within the mission of the AAEA (www.aaea.org/about-aaea).

Scholars should be professional economists who are citizens of and reside in a developing country. A complete list of qualifying countries is available under the headings "Low-income economies" and "Lower-middle-income economies" at: <u>http://data.worldbank.org/about/country-classifications/country-and-lending-groups#Low_income</u>. Scholars should either have completed their terminal degree or will complete it within the year. Students studying in countries that are not considered "low-income economies" and "lower-middle-income economies" may apply, but they must be completing their degree and planning to permanently reside in a "low-income" and "lower-middle-income" country by the end of 2024. Mentors can reside in any part of the world, but each must be an AAEA member.

Your abstract will be reviewed once submitted and you will then be informed if you will be invited to submit a submission to the special issue.

Government Relations & Washington Update

September 2023

Congress Set to Return from August Recess

Congress will return to Washington after August recess to a busy agenda with only a few legislative days remaining in the fiscal year. The House and Senate have yet to complete any of the 12 annual appropriations bills, setting up the prospect of a government shutdown if Congress doesn't act before October 1st. The most likely outcome is a short-term continuing resolution. The Biden administration has formally asked Congress to pass a short-term funding package. Senate Majority Leader Schumer and Minority Leader McConnell have both indicated support for a continuing resolution and House Speaker McCarthy has also signaled that he would go along with that approach. However, McCarthy faces potential opposition from some House Republicans who are hesitant to extend funding without taking action on overall government spending levels and other priorities at the same time. President Biden is also requesting \$44 billion in emergency spending to go along with the continuing resolution that would fund disaster assistance and the war in Ukraine.

Congress also faces the expiration of the Farm Bill at the end of September. While committee staff have worked through the August recess to advance Farm Bill preparations, House and Senate Agriculture Committee leaders have acknowledged it is unlikely that they will complete the Farm Bill reauthorization before the end of September. It is likely that a short-term extension will be considered to maintain authorities while Congress works to complete the Farm Bill.

ERS Releases Latest Outlook for U.S. Agricultural Trade

On August 31st, USDA's Economic Research Service (ERS) has released is latest <u>Outlook for U.S. Agricultural</u> <u>Trade</u>. According to the report, U.S. agricultural exports in fiscal year 2024 are projected at \$172.0 billion, down \$5.5 billion from the forecast for FY 2023. The reduction is largely due to lower exports of soybeans, soybean meal, and dairy products. Overall livestock, poultry, and dairy exports are projected at \$37.6 billion, down \$1.4 billion from FY 2023. Agricultural exports to China are forecast at \$30.0 billion, \$3.0 billion lower from FY 2023, driven by weaker outlook for soybeans, dairy, and beef. Agricultural exports to Mexico and Canada are forecast at \$28.2 billion and \$27.5 billion, respectively, both \$300 million lower from FY 2023. U.S. agricultural imports in FY 2024 are forecast at \$199.5 billion, \$3.0 billion higher than the revised FY 2023 estimate due to higher imports of horticultural and livestock products and stabilizing global prices.

ERS Publishes International Food Security Assessment

In August, ERS published its <u>International Food Security Assessment for 2023–2033</u>. ERS studied food security in 83 low- and middle-income countries and found that food security is estimated to improve in 2023. Growth in per capita income and easing of international and domestic food commodity prices are helping improve food security. According to ERS estimates, 228.9 million fewer people will face food insecurity than in 2022. However, estimated food insecurity remains elevated due to the lingering effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, high food commodity prices, and risks associated with the ongoing war in Urkaine. Despite challenges in the near-term outlook, food security is projected to improve in the next 10 years. By 2033, the number of food insecure people in the 83 IFSA countries is projected to be 385.9 million, 66.1 percent less than the number of people than in 2023. Calls for contribution to Special issue in Agriculture and Human Values: Farm households' social and economic needs and the Future of Agriculture

Efforts to recruit and retain the next generation of farmers have traditionally focused on supporting the farm business through a focus on access to land, capital, and business management skills. While addressing these barriers are important, these efforts are likely insufficient as they fail to consider the full suite of social and economic challenges faced by farm households. From a theoretical standpoint, farm families are embedded in a complex agri-family system. Within the micro-level of this system, the farm household and the farm operation are interconnected through the constant exchange of resources (i.e. time and money). Challenges faced by the farm business can therefore have negative consequences on the farm household, and likewise, challenges faced by the farm household can negatively impact the farm business. Despite these theoretical insights and some empirical evidence that farm families experience household-level challenges connected to health insurance and health care, childcare, and insufficient household income, we know little about how household challenges impact the farm business. Directly connected to this knowledge gap is a limited understanding of the ways in which existing social programs and policies (which are specifically designed to meet these needs) may support farm sector profitability, survivability, resilience, and transition.

We invite theoretical, empirical, and discussion papers at the intersection of farm households' social and economic needs, social programs and policies, and farm business viability for a special issue in the journal Agriculture and Human Values. Farm households' social and economic needs include, but are not limited to: access to health insurance and health care, dependent care (child, elder, home health care), affordable housing, nutrition and food security, poverty, and retirement. The papers can be based on new research or can revisit data previously analyzed with a new eye towards the focus of this special issue. This special issue is connected to an upcoming virtual conference on the topic on September 13th. While the conference is focused on the U.S., farm households' social and economic needs are not unique to the U.S. and the special issue will provide an opportunity to explore these needs in a range of countries. Potential research questions include:

- What are farm households' lived realities meeting their social and economic needs?
- In what ways do the social and economic needs of the household shape decisions connected to the farm operation's production and marketing decisions?
- How do sex, gender, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, and geography intersect with and influence farm household's social and economic needs and the farm enterprise experiences, decision-making and trajectory?
- To what extent can federal and state social safety net programs and policies bolster and increase the profitability, viability, survivability, or resilience of the farm operation?
- What theoretical, data and/or methodological limitations are limiting the exploration of farm families' lived realities meeting their social and economic needs and the intersection with farm business development and viability?
